Bahamian Craftsmen Hone Skills in the UK with The King's Foundation

Far from home but deeply connected to it, eight Bahamian craftsmen are hard at work in workshops and heritage estates across the United Kingdom, chiselling and carving their way through an experience that's reshaping their understanding of craftsmanship and culture.

These men are the inaugural recipients of the Peter George Goulandris Heritage Scholarship, a partnership between Lyford Cay Foundations and The King's Foundation. The five-month programme is designed to preserve traditional building techniques, skills essential to protecting The Bahamas' historic architecture for generations to come.

The journey began at Dumfries House in Scotland, the headquarters of The King's Foundation, with a three-week Summer School exploring drawing, geometry, and the philosophy behind heritage craft. Participants then advanced into a 15-week technical phase focused on the conservation and repair of historic buildings in the traditional Bahamian style, from stonemasonry and timber restoration to plasterwork and roofing.

Their training includes a Live Build Project at Dumfries House in Scotland, offering first-hand experience working on an active heritage site. Now deep into their training, the scholars have been learning from master craftspeople in areas such as blacksmithing, thatching, and stained-glass work.

For Bjorn Munroe, who works with the Antiquities, Monuments and Museums Corporation (AMMC), the experience is already transformative.

"I was hoping to improve my stonemasonry skills, now I'm building and repairing stone walls, learning thatch roofing and plaster moulding. It's more than I ever expected."

Each lesson is building toward a greater goal: equipping these Bahamians to return home with the expertise to restore, protect, and celebrate the nation's architectural heritage. For the awardees, ranging in age from 22 to 40, it is both a personal achievement and a national opportunity. Their journey represents a bridge between past and future, one handcrafted detail at a time.

FOCUS

SUMMER SLAM EXPLORING THE FUTURE WITH AI

For six weeks this summer, FOCUS summer sessions were alive with energy as nearly 250 FOCUS students immersed themselves in discovery, creativity, and community during the 2025 Summer SLAM.

Centered on the theme of Artificial Intelligence (AI), students from Grades 5 through 9 were invited to explore one of the world's most exciting and rapidly changing fields. Guided by their teachers and mentors, they learned how AI powers everyday tools while also confronting the important questions it raises about ethics and responsibility.

Each grade explored the theme from a unique angle, focusing on different applications of AI in everyday use. Younger students, in Grades 5 and 6, investigated Smart Homes, imagining the ways AI can make everyday appliances more efficient, while students in Grade 7 created AI solutions to address environmental challenges like pollution and waste. Our 8th and 9th Graders, collected and analysed data, considering the future of transportation and how AI can aid with traffic congestion, more efficient traffic flow, and prevent accidents. In every case, lessons were hands-on, encouraging students to imagine, problem-solve, and innovate. Alongside their projects, students received over 60 hours of additional tutoring, which strengthened skills in math, science, and language.

FOCUS is about more than academics. Sports, performing arts, and life skills such as resume-building, financial literacy, and interviewing for a job, rounded out a truly holistic experience. Families also played a role, visiting the FOCUS sessions during Parents' Breakfasts, Open Houses, and Showcases. This allowed them to meet programme staff and engage in FOCUS activities. For parents, these are moments of celebration and pride.

Over the summer, students in Grades 10 to 12 focused on building transferable occupational skills, attending the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute, (BTVI), where they learned various trades. Students had the option to participate in courses on carpentry, beauty, and technology over the course of four weeks. At BTVI, students also gained certification in Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). This training equips them for meaningful contributions to the workforce.

For Programme Director Kendra Moss, these highlights speak to the heart of Lyford Cay Foundations' mission. "When we see the enthusiasm and attention our FOCUS students bring each day, we know these investments of time and resources are well worth it," she shared. "The skills and confidence they are building will serve not only their families, but the wider community well into the future."

FAMILY ISLAND LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

Inspiring Future Leaders from All Islands



This July, 49 rising Grade 11 students from across The Bahamas left their Family Island communities and gathered in New Providence for a week that many will never forget. Now in its second year, Lyford Cay Foundations' Family Island Leadership Programme (FILP) provided an immersive residential experience that combined academic preparation, career exploration, leadership development, and personal growth to help students chart a path beyond high school.

Hosted at Breezes Resort Bahamas, with sessions at the University of The Bahamas (UB) and The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI), the programme introduced students to the realities of pursuing post-secondary education while also building the resilience and leadership skills needed for success. Workshops ranged from mastering the college essay to honing public speaking, while a standout panel on "Creativity in

Leadership" encouraged participants to think boldly about their futures.

Beyond the classroom, FILP offered hands-on exposure to career opportunities through site visits to Jet Nassau, Bluefield Farms, and V&M Art Gallery. Along the way, students built friendships with peers from other islands, and heard candid insights from national leaders on topics such as ethical decision-making, communication, and integrity.

"FILP reflects our belief that every young person should have access to the skills, knowledge, and networks they need to thrive," said Dr. Nicola Virgill-Rolle, Executive Director of Lyford Cay Foundations. "We are deeply grateful to our donors, institutional partners, and community leaders for helping create a space where Family Island students can dream bigger and step confidently into their futures."

SUMMER GRANTS

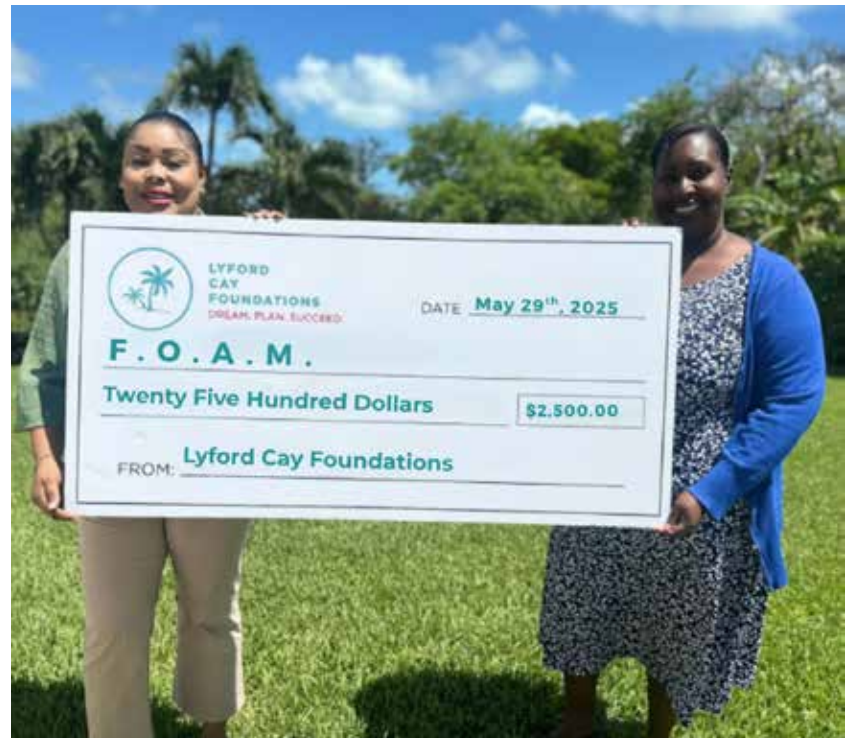
INVESTING IN SAFER COMMUNITIES FOR THE FUTURE

SUMMER GRANT RECIPIENTS 2025

This year's five grantees each offered unique opportunities for learning and growth.

1. **FOAM Bahamas** – \$2,500 to expand coaching, counselling, and art sessions for inner-city youth.

"The programme is open to all inner-city youth in need of mentorship and guidance when dealing with grief," said Founder Khandi Gibson.

2. **Sunset Pilot Club of Grand Bahama** – \$5,000 to deliver a one-week summer programme for older students with special needs.

"We plan to partner with the Beacon School to ensure students receive tailored support," explained Executive Member Keira Cox.

3. **Urban Renewal Marching Band of The Bahamas** – \$5,000 to provide instruments, materials, and transport for young musicians.

"The band not only nurtures musical talent but also transforms lives, reducing crime and building safer communities," shared Coordinator Janice Minnis-Green.

4. **Training Centre for the Disabled** – \$5,000 to cover uniforms, supplies, and equipment for vocational training.

"It's all about ability, not disability," said President Rivianna Smith, noting the Centre's focus on independence for students.

5. **REACH** – \$5,000 to run a vocational and self-help programme for young adults with autism, open to applicants across The Bahamas.

"The programme builds confidence and personal growth through hands-on experience," said Speech Language Pathologist Nafeesa Arafat.

Support from the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) and the Antiquities, Monuments and Museums Corporation (AMMC) has been central in preparing the apprentices for this step. With their foundation of skills now set to be honed by world-class training, the scholars will join the growing international network of craftspeople dedicated to heritage preservation.

The scholarship is not only a tribute to one man's legacy but also a forward-looking investment: ensuring that The Bahamas' unique cultural and architectural traditions are preserved for generations to come.
